HIGHLIGHTS OF 2018-2019



April 2018: New initiative in partnership with fellow Neighbourhood Resource Centres goes into full swing to support the social integration of newcomers.



May 2018: Literacy team offers Shared Beginnings program at a 3rd location, the Family Centre Fanshawe.



June 2018: LUSO is awarded the City of London's Innovation Grant of \$80,000 to implement Phase 2 of the Cultural Sensitivity & Awareness Project. In 2019, this project will develop tools to aid landlords in supporting London's Nepalese-speaking/Bhutanese refugee and Latin American communities.



June 2018: In partnership with Family Centre Carling-Thames, LUSO joins the Good Food Box Program, which offers local, seasonal & affordable produce to residents across the city of London on a monthly basis.



July 2018: LUSO partners with faith-based organizations in NE London to support 6 summer camps, providing over 7,400 breakfast/snacks to 214 unique children each day over a 7 week period.



August 2018: LUSO receives a \$5,000 donation through CIBC Miracle Day. Funds support a variety of literacy-based programs.



September 2018: LUSO recognizes Siloam United Church and volunteer Donna Rodrigues with its Community Award. The award recognized their significant impact on LUSO's programs and services.



October 2018: Over 100 people attended this year's Newcomer Family Pumpkin Carving event! Families had the opportunity to participate in the North American tradition of carving pumpkins in celebration of Halloween.



October 2018: We partnered with ReForest London to plant 160 trees in Admiral Park. 82 individuals participated, including many Newcomers who shared stories about the cultural significance of trees in their home countries



November 2018: Excited to support United Way's campaign by raising \$7,115 through LUSO's Workplace Campaign. We had set a goal of \$6,500.



December 2018: In partnership with United Way GenNext, LUSO helped facilitate the annual *Give Cold Feet the Boot* drive. We were thrilled to distribute over 130 pairs of boots to residents in NE London.



January 2019: "Dive into Reading", our Family Literacy Day event welcomed 184 unique participants to enjoy ocean themed literacy activities. Highlights included singing and playing with Beechnut Steel, making positive affirmation bracelets and buttons with NELCE. Families left with free books, resources and new ideas on how to boost literacy at home.



February 2019: Two Nursing placement students implemented a *Sustainable Food Options* program at our Community Portable, which provides clients with dried foods like rice, oatmeal and lentils in reusable containers, as well as information about cost effectiveness, and the nutritional value of these choices.



March 2019: Canadian-born and Newcomer families participated in a trip to the Kinsmen Fanshawe Sugarbush. Everyone learned about the history of maple syrup in Canada, the seasonal process of making it, and they enjoyed some of the final product on top of a hot stack of pancakes!



March 2019: The theme of LUSO's annual *Stop Racism Video Contest* was "A Generation Without Racism". Winners were celebrated at a awards ceremony at Saunders Secondary School on March 21st; The International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination.

Multicultural Outreach

The Multicultural Outreach Program provides workshops, presentations and training on race relations, racial bullying, cultural diversity and awareness to youth, parents, professionals and community groups. The program addresses audiences in schools, group homes, financial institutions, corporations, community organizations, sport teams, conferences, as well as home and school associations.



62 schools and **9** community groups received service

317 workshops and presentations were conducted



29 videos were submitted to the Stop Racism Video Contest

Over 300 people attended the award's ceremony



12,660 people reached in London

1,376 people reached in Middlesex County



Impact Story

Michael is a youth client that immigrated to Canada in 2011. He began his interactions with LUSO Community Services as a client of the SWIS program and soon became involved within the Northeast Youth Program. Being a client in many different programs, he soon began to build his English and confidence. He has always shown so much dedication and eagerness to get involved with the organization in whatever capacity he is able to do so. In 2014, he became a member of the Y.O.L.O. team where his personality and commitment shined so brightly. He continued to support this team as a youth leader/volunteer and after many conversations with the Youth Worker at LUSO he soon realized he wanted to pursue a career as a Child and Youth Worker. Michael has mentioned that the Youth Worker at LUSO inspired him to pursue a career working with youth, which is such a meaningful connection. Today Michael is completing the CYC Diploma Program at Fanshawe College, continues to support LUSO as a youth volunteer, and has worked two consecutive summers as an employee. Michael hopes to be a future employee of LUSO Community Services after graduation in 2020!



Youth

Youth Programs provide meaningful opportunities for young people between the ages of 11-19 to develop skills and become actively engaged in their community. Programs focus on four key areas: Relationships & Inclusion, Leadership & Community Engagement, Education & Skill Building, and Healthy Eating & Physical Activity.

Curtis is a youth client that has been involved with LUSO Community Services over the past six years. He resides in the Argyle neighbourhood and has such a passion for being involved in his community. He is a dreamer and is not afraid to tackle any challenge that comes his way! He is one of the original youth leaders that formed the Y.O.L.O. team (Youth Organizing Leadership Opportunities) back in 2014 and is still very engaged in this group as a youth mentor. He continues to inspire others in his community and his confidence and infectious sense of humor shines through every single day! We are lucky to have a young person like Curtis blazing the path for other youth in Northeast London!



Literacy

Programs provide a variety of literacy based activities and services for families and children up to 12 years of age residing in Northeast London. Programs aim to engage both children and their families in developing literacy and numeracy skills in a safe, fun, and supportive environment. Our literacy programs encourage shared learning and skill development of children, parents and caregivers.



19 Family Literacy Events hosted,reaching 879 children, youth and adults



290 unique families, representing 612 people access Shared Beginnings at 3 Community Locations



42 children and 37 adults participated in Family Math



33 children received weekly support through the Literacy Booster Club

Impact Story

Children have been actively involved in literacy activities at our summer Books & Breakfast Program. The child pictured was very excited about reading under a sun umbrella with our staff and community volunteers each week. He developed the confidence to ask facilitators and volunteers to come read to him. His favourite book to read this summer was Mom, The School Flooded by Ken Rivard.



Basic Needs & Community Support

The Basic Needs & Community Support Program provides information, referrals and support to residents in Northeast London. Residents can access our community portable and receive assistance with basic needs items such as: clothing, food, baby food and diapers. We also offer a variety of skill building sessions and opportunities for individuals to gain knowledge that will help with navigating through life's challenges.

Impact Story

Mike is a recipient of the Ontario Disability Support Program due to a brain injury sustained many years ago; living on a fixed income, his basic needs were not being met and he felt as if he was "struggling to survive." In January, he vowed to seek help which led him to the NE Food Depot where he met LUSO staff and nursing students. In the following weeks, Mike visited the Portable for some additional supports and attended our Market and Sugarbush trips which served as a way to break isolation and meet other residents in the community. We learned quickly that Mike has many passions and interests. He loves music and is a talented guitarist; he had been creating a hand-built guitar for 18 months. In March, Mike brought the finished product to the Portable; it was a privilege to share in his joy and to hear him play. This moment demonstrated Mike's personal growth over the course of just three short months, growth that would not have been possible had Mike's basic needs not been met, and had he not felt supported and strengthened by his community. Mike continues to visit the Portable, sometimes as needed and sometimes just for a coffee and a chat!



Settlement Workers in Schools

Settlement Workers are placed in both elementary and secondary schools within Northeast London. SWIS facilitate the integration of newcomer students and families into the education system and community. SWIS is a partnership with the Thames Valley District Board & the London District Catholic School Board.

Library Settlement Partnership

Settlement Workers provide information & referrals to newcomers in one-to-one and group settings on issues pertaining to settlement and integration into the community. The program connects newcomers to community programs and services. LSP is in partnership with the London Public Library.

Community Connections

Community Connections activities are geared to those holding permanent resident status in Canada. Programs offer opportunities to build skills to assist newcomers adjust to life in Canada. Programming includes conversation circles, leadership development, family events and cultural activities for youth & adults.

Settlement Counselling

Settlement Counsellors provide newcomers with individualized support, advocacy, information, and referrals on settlement and integration related issues. Settlement Counsellors provide one-to-one needs assessments to help clients with immediate settlement needs such as: housing, health care, education, employment, legal matters, immigration, and many others.

Neighbourhood Social Integration Project

Neighbourhood Social Integration project was a 15 month pilot project in partnership with other Neighbourhood Resource Centres. It aimed to provide targeted programming that was adapted to the needs of clients who faced significant settlement barriers. It connected clients to a lasting network of supports that are available in their neighbourhoods.



Community Engagement







We continue to be a member of the London Food Coalition. The Coalition is a coordinated food alliance that rescues high-quality fresh food and redistributes it to Londoners in need. As one of its members, LUSO has benefitted greatly; we have been able to provide fresh fruit and vegetables at our community food cupboard and programs and saved almost \$6,000 per year.



LUSO has been an member of the CYN since it's inception in 2007. As an active member, LUSO provides a voice in the larger strategy as well as participates in the Literacy, Ending Poverty and Family Centred Service System sub-groups.



LUSO is one of five **Neighbourhood Resource Centres** in London. We use a Community Development approach to empower London's vulnerable populations. We collaborate on initiatives with the other NRC's to respond to the needs identified in our neighbourhoods; deliver programs at multiple sites and empower residents.
